Summer 2017 Course Descriptions		
Course Name	Instructor	Course Description
Administrative Law	Kelley	Course is constructed around Federal materials, but with some state references. Considers the origin and constitutional basis for the administrative process; executive and legislative controls with particular emphasis upon the judicial "control" of the administrative process (delegations, procedural and substantive due process, judicial assistance and enforcement and review of administrative decisions).
Ag. Cooperatives & Local Food Sys	Manning	This course is designed to provide students with an introduction to agricultural business formation and cooperatives. We will begin by discussing the importance of considering business entity formation at the outset of any agricultural enterprise. Students will acquire skills necessary in counseling clients and ensuring that they, as practitioners, understand the client's business needs.
Arkansas Landlord-Tenant Law	Prettyman	The course will explore Arkansas landlord tenant law along with proposals for revision of the law. Topics covered will be the forcible entry and detainer statute, the security deposit statute, the failure to vacate statute, the residential landlord tenant act, and Arkansas's limitation on tort liability for landlords. Discussion on the federal laws governing HUD tenancies and the greater rights afforded in those tenancies. The course will discuss both theory and practice.
Bankruptcy	Tarvin	Study of insolvency law, with particular emphasis on federal bankruptcy law.
Civil Litigation Discovery	Carithers	Students will be engaging in all aspects of pre trial discovery in a mock civil lawsuit, applying Arkansas law and Arkansas Rules of Civil Procedure. The specific skills covered include written discovery, interrogatories and requests for documents, deposition taking and defending, witness interview and case analysis, dispositive motion practice and jury instructions.

<p>Civil Litigation & Advocacy Clinic</p>	<p>Morrison</p>	<p>Students will represent low-income clients seeking to enforce their rights in civil matters. Under close faculty supervision, students will develop and refine their ability to effectively and ethically practice law. Students will handle all aspects of client representation, including interviewing and counseling, fact investigation and discovery, negotiation, and court appearances. Students will also participate in a weekly seminar and may have the opportunity to engage in other forms of advocacy. Cumulative GPA of 2.00, successful completion of 48 semester hours, including Civil Procedure I and II, Criminal Procedure, Evidence, and Professional Responsibility, and qualifying for Rule XV practice. Prerequisite: LAWW 4173 Criminal Procedure, LAWW 5013 Professional Responsibility and LAWW 6093 Basic Evidence.</p>
<p>Criminal Procedure I</p>	<p>Bailey</p>	<p>Generally this course focuses on: (1) criminal investigation practices, more precisely, contacts between the police and persons suspected or accused of crime, at the time of or shortly before and after arrest; (2) the federal constitutional rights of suspects in their contacts with the police or, stated another way, the federal constitutional restrictions (or lack of restrictions) on the police, based on the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 14th amendments; (3) the exclusionary rule, which limits the admissibility of evidence obtained by the police from suspects in violation of their federal constitutional rights; and (4) United States Supreme Court jurisprudence. Prerequisite: LAWW 6924 Civil Litigation & Advocacy Clinic.</p>
<p>Domestic Relations</p>	<p>Prettyman</p>	<p>Devoted primarily to the problems generated by family relationships. There is a large section on formation and dissolution of marriage. Substantial time is also given to paternity and legitimacy, obligations toward and of children, custody, adoption, guardianship, general property law as it is affected by family relationships, and divorce and custody in the federal system (focusing primarily on enforceability of decrees in one state by courts sitting in another state).</p>
<p>Financial Crimes</p>	<p>Tidwell</p>	<p>This course will provide a brief overview of the capital markets and key players in the markets, review selected civil and criminal statutes relating to financial crimes and the investigation and litigation of financial crimes. The focus will be on the indictment, arguments advanced by each defendant and government's response, deferred prosecution agreements, settlement documents, and the sentencing briefs submitted by defendants and by the government. Also critique the regulatory response to financial crimes.</p>

Legislation	Trammell	Law in the United States increasingly comes from written texts—statutes, ordinances, and administrative regulations. This course will introduce the primary tools that lawyers use when interpreting these texts. It will begin with an overview of various theories and methodological approaches to interpretation. Then it will turn to the ways that lawyers and courts discern the meaning of legal texts (including through canons of interpretation) and construe those texts in light of external sources of authority (including legislative history and other texts). At various points during the course, students will apply these tools to hypothetical and real-world problems
Oil and Gas	Norvell	Study of the law of oil and gas with emphasis on the interests that may be created in oil and gas, the rights of the landowner, provisions in the oil and gas lease, the rights of assignees, and legislation dealing with production and conservation.
Representing Startups	Regnier	This course will cover the issues that arise when representing new or young companies that aim for rapid growth and an exit strategy of sale or public offering within a relatively short time frame. Topics will include a broad survey of entity formation, corporate governance through the growth stage, protection of intellectual property, employment matters common to start-ups (including obligations founders may owe to previous employers), fundraising from angel or venture capital investments including both debt and equity financing, securities law compliance, sale of the company and stock offerings, and ethical issues common to lawyers representing start-ups.
ULW Civil Pretrial Docs	Killenbeck, A.	Students will develop the abilities necessary to function as an effective civil litigation attorney. The course focuses on pre-trial preparation and practice. Students will learn and then apply rules, procedures, and skills necessary for a broad spectrum of pretrial activities.
