Summer 2019 Course Descriptions		
Course Name	Instructor	Course Description
Administrative Law (online)	Kelley	Course is constructed around Federal materials, but with some state references. Considers the origin and constitutional basis for the administrative process; executive and legislative controls with particular emphasis upon the judicial "control" of the administrative process (delegations, procedural and substantive due process, judicial assistance and enforcement and review of administrative decisions).
Arkansas Tenant/Landlord Law	Prettyman, M.	The course will explore Arkansas landlord tenant law along with proposals for revision of the law. Topics covered will be the forcible entry and detainer statute, the security deposit statute, the failure to vacate statute, the residential landlord tenant act, and Arkansas's limitation on tort liability for landlords. Discussion on the federal laws governing HUD tenancies and the greater rights afforded in those tenancies. The course will discuss both theory and practice.
Banking Law (Online)	Foster, S.	This class is designed to provide law students with a detailed overview of banking law. Subjects we will cover include the business of banking, banking regulation, bank assets, consumer lending, bank liabilities and capital, supervision, expansion and mergers, trust and fiduciary standards, capital markets, derivatives, insurance and international banking.
Criminal Procedure I	Sacharoff	Generally this course focuses on: (1) criminal investigation practices, more precisely, contacts between the police and persons suspected or accused of crime, at the time of or shortly before and after arrest; (2) the federal constitutional rights of suspects in their contacts with the police or, stated another way, the federal constitutional restrictions (or lack of restrictions) on the police, based on the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 14th amendments; (3) the exclusionary rule, which limits the admissibility of evidence obtained by the police from suspects in violation of their federal constitutional rights; and (4) United States Supreme Court jurisprudence. Prerequisite: LAWW 6924 Civil Litigation & Advocacy Clinic.
Deposition Practice	Elliott, D.	The focus of this class is to teach how to take, defend and use depositions in civil cases. There will be extensive study of Rules 28-32 of the Arkansas and Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. Additionally, the State and Federal cases applicable to depositions will be discussed and reviewed. Discussion on the practicality of a deposition such as the timing, scheduling and expenses in depositions. Students will observe parts of several video depositions followed by a discussion.

Drafting Legislation in Arkansas	Noland, R.	
Evidence	Nunn	Study of the rules of evidence under which trials are conducted; the methods by which items of evidence are admitted or excluded; relevancy, real evidence, testimonial proof, and hearsay and its exceptions.
Family Law (online)	Brill	Devoted primarily to the problems generated by family relationships. There is a large section on formation and dissolution of marriage. Substantial time is also given to paternity and legitimacy, obligations toward and of children, custody, adoption, guardianship, general property law as it is affected by family relationships, and divorce and custody in the federal system (focusing primarily on enforceability of decrees in one state by courts sitting in another state).
Financial Crimes	Tidwell	This course examines financial crimes that may result in civil and/or criminal liability. A major focus of the course will be on illegal insider trading, including the investigation and litigation of insider trading cases, the judicial definition of insider trading and evidence typically used to support a conviction. We will also examine money laundering, bank frauds, securities frauds, and Ponzi schemes. We will review and discuss selected court documents from recent cases involving financial crimes that resulted in billion-dollar settlements and/or findings of liability. We will also cover procedures used to investigate and litigate financial crimes as well as defenses and sentencing issues that may arise with respect to financial crimes.
First Amendment	Killenbeck, M.	An intensive examination of the legal issues arising under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution, with an emphasis on basic free speech doctrines and the dilemmas posed by interplay between the free exercise and establishment clauses.
Jury Trial Strategies	Hixson	The goal is to introduce students to the preparation of a jury trial. Begin with a discussion of meeting with clients for the first time, evaluating the case and taking the case to trial. Three vignettes, each will have substantive law issues; discovery issues and ethical issues. Class divided into sections and each section will be assigned one of the three vignettes for the entire week. The first half of the class will include reviewing the assigned text and the second half of the class will be application of the text to the three vignettes.

Literature and Law	Circo/Candido	We will read and discuss five works from a literary point of view, emphasizing matters such as theme, style, structure, characterization, and the like, but with special attention to those issues in the works that suggest moral, legal, or ethical problems of interpretation. The object here is twofold: 1) to give students a solid literary understanding of these works and to demonstrate how one might interpret them from a conventional literary perspective, and 2) to alert the students to issues in these works to be taken up in greater detail and complexity from a legal point of view in the companion course, Shakespeare and Law
Shakespeare and Law	Circo/Candido	This course explores what the plays covered in the companion Literature and Law course teach about moral, legal, and ethical problems. Secondly, it will draw related lessons from some of the best literary expositions of law. Scholars in the field sometimes label the first inquiry the study of law in literature and the second the study of law as literature
Litigation Strategies for Civil Rights Claims	Noland, A.	
Product Liability (online)	Leflar	An intensive study of the area including a review of the theories of liability; the concepts of product and defect; potential defendants; defenses; problems of proof and causation.
Professional Responsibility	Woods	Role of the lawyer as counselor, advocate, and public servant; obligation to society of the individual lawyer and the profession as a whole; ethical problems of the profession; representation of the unpopular cause and the desirable client, lawyers' obligation to law reform; lawyer and the press; the lawyer in public service; the aspects of law office management.
Regulation of Cryptocurrency Transactions	Goforth	This one-credit class will introduce students to blockchain, bitcoin, and other cryptoassets, as well as the range of transactions and businesses in which such assets are used. It will begin with an overview of terminology, and then introduce students to the ways in which the U.S. has chosen to regulate cryptoassets. Although the class will touch on financial regulation, securities regulation, and commodities regulation of cryptoassets, no background in these subjects is required or expected. Taxation of cryptoassets will be dealt with very briefly, if at all. Time permitting, there will be a brief introduction to state and international regulation at the end of the class. Student learning will be assessed via a take-home examination made available the last class session.

Russia Summer Law Program	Brill	Russia Law Summer Program: the course will cover Russian, international and comparative topics which may include Constitutional History of Russia, Comparative Federalism, Comparative Freedom of Religion, War crimes and terrorism, international adoption, international finance, secession and breakup of nations. The course includes travel to St. Petersburg, Russia in August.
ULW Civil Pretrial Docs	Manning	Students will develop the abilities necessary to function as an effective civil litigation attorney. The course focuses on pre-trial preparation and practice. Students will learn and then apply rules, procedures, and skills necessary for a broad spectrum of pretrial activities.
