# Non-Agricultural Work

- 16 & 17: Unlimited hours; Cannot work in Hazardous Occupations (HOs).
- 14 & 15: Variety of non-manufacturing and non-Hazardous occupations for limited periods of time under specified conditions. Any work not specifically permitted is prohibited.
- Under 14: Cannot work in non-ag occupations covered by the FLSA.
- Exception: Children generally permitted to work for businesses entirely owned by their parents except those under 16 cannot be employed in mining or manufacturing.



# **Examples of Hos (Non-Ag)**

- Work in most jobs where explosives are manufactured or stored;
- Driving motor vehicle or work as an outside helper on motor vehicles (with some permissions for 17 year-olds);
- Operating most power-driven woodworking machines;
- Operating on, riding on, and assisting in operating most powerdriven hoisting apparatus;
- Operating certain power-driven metal-working machines;
- Operating power-driven meat processing machines;
- Most jobs in meat and poultry slaughtering and packing plants.



# **Agricultural Work**

- 16 & 17: Can work any farm job any time.
- 14 & 15: Can work outside school hours in jobs not declared hazardous by Secretary (some exceptions for student learners, etc.).
- 12 & 13: Can work outside school hours in jobs not declared hazardous on farms <u>also</u> employed by parents or with written parental consent.
- **Under 12**: Can work outside school hours in jobs not declared hazardous with parental consent <u>only on farms where none of the employees are subject to minimum wage requirements of FLSA.</u>
- Any age: Can work any time in any job on farm operated by their parents.



### **Examples of Hazardous Occupations in Ag**

- Operating tractor over 20 PTO horsepower (or connecting/disconnecting its implements);
- Working from a ladder or scaffold at height of over 20 feet;
- Driving a bus, truck, or automobile to transport passengers, or riding on a tractor as a passenger or helper;
- Certain silo/food storage occupations.
